



Dorrigo Evans, an Australian surgeon in a POW camp on the


Thai-Burma railway, is watching his men slowly and cruelly die, trying desperately to protect them, while being consumed by past events in his own life. Flanagan's book jumps






# Shame and the Captives Tom Keneally
